Sermon: Our God Who Remembers.

Series: Exodus: From Slavery to Glory. Date: September 11, 2022

**OBSERVATION** -- As a group, talk through and summarize the passage. Think through *Who, What, Where, When, How, Why* questions together.

**INTERPRETATION** -- Answer these questions together:

## 1. What does this passage teach us about us?

a) In Exodus 2 we find Moses struggling to know who he is. Is he Egyptian? Hebrew? Midianite? In what ways do you struggle to find identity? What identities have you embraced in the past that let you down? How would you answer the question "Who are you?"

**Scripture:** Exodus 2.

# 2. What does this passage teach us about God?

- a) Re-read Exodus 2:23-25. What does it mean to you that God hears, remembers, sees, and knows us?
- b) God had to respond to the cries of the enslaved Hebrews because he has made promises to them (the Abrahamic Covenant). What promises has God made to you that you can expect him to remember and keep?

# 3. What does this passage teach us about grace/salvation? How does it point to Christ?

- a) Read Hebrews 11:24-26. The author says that Moses considered the reproach of Christ greater than the treasure of Egypt. How does Moses' life in Exodus 2 point to the life of Jesus?
- b) What does the reproach of Christ (his shame and disgrace) teach us about the character of God and the purpose of humanity?

#### **APPLICATION**

- a) The way God "remembered" and acted to save his people was through the life of Moses, including his failures, but Moses tried to run away. Is there anything in your past that you are running away from/hiding that God can use instead to show his grace and love?
- b) Read Hebrews 11:24-26. How did Moses demonstrate his faith? What lesson can we learn from Moses' faith?

### **PRAYER**

- Thank God that he makes and keeps his promises to us.
- Confess ways that you have tried to create an identity apart from God.
- Thank Jesus for forsaking sin and treasure in order to save you.
- Ask God to help you to never forget that he hears, sees, remembers, and knows you.
